Verb of preference: *to like doing something*

o **Examples:**

o *I **like** going to the cinema.*

o *Would you **like** a cup of coffee?*

o *I **like** chatting online.*

Verb of desire:

to feel like doing something

o to want to do something or to think that one would like to do / to have something

o I feel **like** having a drink

o We'll go for a walk if you feel **like** it.

Preposition

- We use *like* as a preposition in these ways:
- to show that things are similar.
- *My sister is **like** my dad and she hates getting up early.*
- to ask for an opinion or a general description of something.
- *What is she **like**? What type of person is she?*

Preposition

- 0 We use *like* as a preposition in these ways:
- 0 to ask about appearance
- 0 *What does Kristen Stewart look **like**?*
- 0 to give an example:
- 0 *You can buy things for your avatar **like** virtual clothes and jewelry.*

Noun

- **Likes and dislikes** – things one does and does not like
- *He has so many **likes and dislikes** that it's impossible to please him.*
- **Somebody's likings** - somebody's taste, preference, sympathy to something.
- *It's not easy to find clothes to her **likings**.*

Adjective

- **To be alike** – having some or all qualities or features of, similar
- They are so **alike**, though they are not twins.
- All music is **alike** to him.
- These two photos are almost **alike**.

Compound words with like

- **Homelike** – home-made; comfortable
- *The restaurant they had dinner at was very homelike.*
- **Like-minded** – having similar tastes or opinions.
- *I have complained to my MP, and urge all like-minded people to do the same.*
- **Like-wise** – similarly
- *The food was excellent, and **likewise** the wine.*
