

## CRIMINAL LAW

### TAKING OTHER PEOPLE'S STUFF

**Theft** – the illegal act of taking something (tangible & intangible objects, IP rights) **secretly** that belongs to someone else and keeping it

**Larceny** – a crime involving the unlawful taking or theft of the personal property of another person or business (only tangible objects)

**Robbery** - the crime of taking or attempting to take anything of value by force, threat of force, or by putting the victim in fear

**Burglary**, also **breaking and entering** or **housebreaking** – illegally entering a building or other areas to steal something

**Shoplifting** - the theft of goods from an open retail establishment

**Pickpocketing** – stealing from someone's pockets

### PHYSICAL VIOLENCE

**Assault** - the act of inflicting unwanted physical contact upon a person or a threat or attempt to commit such an action

**Battery** - the act of inflicting physical harm

**Homicide** – murder or killing of a person (may be intentional or may result from accidental, reckless, or negligent acts even if there is no intent to cause harm)

**Murder** – intentional killing

## PAST SIMPLE AND PAST CONTINUOUS

### Past simple

- Finished events, single completed actions in the past which have a definite time
- Past habits and routine
- Permanent situations
- General facts about the past
- main events in a narrative

#### Past continuous

- Actions happening at a particular moment in the past
- Actions in progress over a period of time
- 2 simultaneous actions in progress
- Annoying pat habits (always)
- Temporary situations in the past
- Background information in a story

## PAST PERFECT SIMPLE AND PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS


### Past perfect simple

- Situations longer in the past before other situations in the past
- Completed actions before a moment in the past
- Completed actions where the important thing is the result at the moment in the past


### Past perfect continuous

Actions continuing up to a certain moment in the past

Both common after verbs such as: realize, remember, know, understand, etc.
