Retromania it's impossible to understand modern culture, especially music videos.

- Given the music ability to tell a story—simple and straightforward lyrics are still considered more important in a song than complex or new rhythms, tempos and melodies— one would think that its adaptation to a short-form narrative music video would have been natural and easy.
- Contemporary youth films, and their impact on rock culture can be more clearly understood if we begin by briefly considering the youth films that were part of the emergence of rock culture itself.

 The authenticity of rock has always been measured by its sound and, most commonly, by its voice. Obviously, given the contexts in which rock was made available to the majority of fans, it is not surprising that its ideology would focus on sound.
