


Sidney Patrick Crosby MY IDOL

Sidney Patrick Crosby -Canadian hockey player, center forward.

Sidney Crosby was born in Cole Harbor, Nova Scotia, in the family of Troy and Trine Crosby. Sidney has a younger sister Taylor. Father Sidney was a goalkeeper and played for Verdun Junior Canadiens from QMJHL. In 1984, he was drafted by the Montreal Canadiens team under the overall 240 number, but he never played in the NHL.

Sidney began to practice with a stick and puck in the basement of the parent's house at the age of two. The drying apparatus, standing nearby, was put out of action after the throws of the future NHL star. In three years, Sidney learned to skate



From the age of 12 Crosby played for various teams in the junior leagues of Canada. In 2003, he began to play for the team "Rimuski Osianik" in the Main Junior Hockey League of Quebec (QMJHL) - one of the three largest junior Canadian hockey leagues.

As part of the "Rimuski Oceanic" Crosby spent two full seasons: 2003/2004 and 2004/2005. In both of them he received the titles of the best scorer and the most valuable player not only in QMJHL, but also in the Canadian Hockey League (CHL), the league that unites the three strongest regional junior leagues of Canada. In the 2004/2005 season, the Crosby team also won the QMJHL championship and was given the right to play in the CHL champions tournament under the name of the Memorial Cup. However, in the final match of this tournament, "Rimuski Oceanic" lost to the team "London Knights" with a score of 0: 4.


Between these two seasons, in August 2004, only Crosby, who celebrated his 17th birthday, received an offer from a professional adult Hamilton team, announced for participation in the WWA, again revived on the occasion of the lockout in the NHL. Crosby was offered a three-year deal worth \$ 7.5 million, but he rejected it, arguing that he was not ready to play in a professional team.



Sidney Crosby is a high-tech player, equally good in both attack and defensive action. Has a high level of vision of the site and hockey thinking, which allows the player himself to go on strike positions, and to bring their teammates to them. Also, the player's strengths are good skating and leadership qualities.

Crosby can take on the game and lead the partners along. Unusual for such talented players, the feature of Crosby's hockey is his tendency to fight a lot at the sides and in front of the gate, where he often gets punches with clubs. The game on the "patch" allows Crosby to throw a lot of "junk" goals with finishing and punching the puck on the fly, but some experts have expressed concerns that this style may have a negative impact on the late stages of the player's career.

Being the central striker on the role, confidently feels at the point of face-off. Also, experts note Crosby's hard work and his habit of working on himself, improving his shortcomings. To the weak sides of the player can be attributed to his uneasy character and increased propensity to injury, and at the start of his career Crosby was often accused of simulation and had a reputation as "crybaby."




Crosby lived in the house of Mario Lemieux together with his family from 2005 to 2010. In the spring of 2010 Crosby acquired his own house in the same area.

Together with the company Reebok Crosby has developed and launched its own clothing line - Rbk SC87.

Although Crosby is a hockey player, his clothes are not designed for hockey.

Photos of Sidney Crosby appeared on the pages of the November issue of GQ magazine in 2005. And in 2007 he entered the list of 100 most influential people in the world according to Time magazine. In 2008, he appeared in the documentary Pond Hockey, where he talked about his experience playing hockey on a frozen pond.

Sidney Crosby is not famous for Lovelace and does not expose his personal life to the show. His only famous girl is the American model Kathy Lutner, with whom he has been in relationship since 2008.
