

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
Introduction

This principle assumes particular importance in FLT because it is largely concerned with a constant growth of language and speech units, words, word-combinations, idioms, clichés which are to be stored and retained in the pupils' memory so that the learners could use them in listening comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing.



Durable and long lasting instructions can be ensured by:

1. the content of the material to be studied;

5. a systematic control of the material to be assimilated helps retain it in the pupils' memory;

2. the presentation of new material should be vivid, bright and live;

4. this material should be used individually and creatively to solve communicative tasks in speaking, reading and writing; 3. a great deal of repetitive work supplemented by assimilation

The afore-mentioned makes it possible to make the following

recommendations:

1. while imparting new material show the learners its significance for communication;

2. try to establish different relationships tapering the learners' thoughts and feelings;

3. use the new material in various verbal contexts so that the pupils could use it;

4. employ various types of testing and evaluation to ensure a feed-back;

5. the language material should be regularly reviewed to ensure better results;

6. durability leads to confidence building and makes the learners feel comfortable and at ease.

Seven Ways to Promote Good Concentration Skills:

1.Set realistic tasks, especially considering your child's maturity level. Unrealistic expectations create frustration, which then interferes with concentration.

2.Break up the tasks into small steps or parts. If you or your child are not used to studying for an hour straight, then break up homework time into shorter spans to allow for breaks.

3.Create a distraction-free zone. Lots of noise and visual distractions can limit concentration and focus.

4.Be supportive and encouraging. Learning a new skill can be challenging, and learning to concentrate is no different. Encourage your child with verbal praise during fun games, as well the more serious homework times.

5.Play fun concentration-building games. More of these below!

6.Get good <u>nutrition</u>, plenty of <u>sleep</u>, plenty of sleep, and <u>exercise</u>, plenty of sleep, and exercise. Our brains need a <u>healthy lifestyle</u> to function at its best.
7.Allow plenty of time for <u>free play</u>, entertainment, and hobbies.



Directions: Print 2 copies of each vocabulary page, laminate for durability, and cut out cards. Turn each card face down. Students take turns identifying the matches according to the English/Language Arts category (e.g. parts of speech, parts of a sentence) and associated vocabulary listed.
