



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LITERATURE

- The English playwright and poet <u>William Shakespeare</u> is widely regarded as the greatest dramatist of all time, <u>Marlowe</u> and his contemporaries <u>Christopher</u> <u>Marlowe</u> and <u>Ben Joman</u> have also been held in continuous high esteem. More recently the playwrights <u>Alan Ayckbourn</u>, <u>Harold Pinter</u>, <u>Michael Frayn</u>, <u>Tom Stoppard</u> and <u>Bayid Edgar</u> have combined elements of surrealism, realism and radicalism.
- Notable pre-modern and early-modern English writers include Chauser (14th century), Thomas Malory (15th century), Sir Thomas More(16th century), John Bunyan (17th century) and <u>John Milton</u> (17th century). In the 18th century <u>Daniel Defoe</u> (author of <u>Robinson Crusoe</u>) and <u>Samuel Richardson</u> were pioneers of the <u>modern novel</u>. In the 19th century there followed further innovation by <u>Jane Austen</u>, the gothic novelist <u>Mary Shelley</u>, the children's writer Lewis Carroll, the Brontë sisters, the social campaigner the naturalist Thomas Hardy, the <u>realistGeorge Eliot</u>, the visionary poet <u>William</u> <u>Blake</u> and romantic poet <u>William Wordsworth</u>. 20th century English writers include the science-fiction novelist H. G. Wells; the writers of children's classics Kipling, A. A. Milne (the creator of Winnie-the-Pooh), Roald Dahl and Enid Ulyto the controversial D. H. Lawrence; the modernist Virginia Woolf; the satirist Eve <u>Waugh;</u> the prophetic novelist <u>George Orwell</u>; the popular novelists <u>W. Some</u> Maugham and Graham Greene; the crime writer Agatha Christie (the best sell novelist of all time); the poets T Eliot, Philip Larkin and <u>Ted Hughes;</u> the <u>fantasy</u> writers <u>J. R. R. Tolkien, C</u> Lewis and J. K. Rowling; the graphic novelists <u>Alan Moore</u> and <u>Neil Gaiman</u>



Various styles of music are popular in the UK from the indigenous folk music of music, Scotland and Northern Ireland to heavy metal. Notable composers of classical music from the United Kingdom and the countries that preceded it include the most famous for working with the librettist Sir W. S. Gilber), Ralph Maria and the foremost living composers. The UK is also home to world-renowned symphonic orchestras and choruses such as the BBC Symphony Orchestra and the London States. Notable conductors include Sir Simon Rattle, Sir John Barbiroli and Sargen. Some of the notable tim score composers include John Barry, Clim Mary, Monta and the London States and wrote the British coronation anthem, while some of his best works, such as Maxim, were written in the English language.
