THE BRITISH MONARCHY

- Constitutional monarchy
- Decolonisation 1947 (India, Pakistan and Ceylon)
- 1949 Commonwealth (Ireland, Burma, the Sudan,

Canada, Australia, New Zealand)

- The House of Commons and the House of Lords





THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT THE ELECTORAL SYSTEM

- Members of Parliament MPs
- At a general election or at a by-election
- Parliamentary elections 5 years
- The Cabinet of Ministers
- Shadow Cabinet





THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

- 650 members
- The Speaker
- Front-benchers
- Back-benchers





THE HOUSE OF LORDS

- 1000 members
- 250 are active in the work of the House
- The right of inheritance
- The Lord Chancellor
- The Woolsack
- 700 years

- 17TH century
- The Conservative and Liberal 19th century
- The Social Democratic Party 1981, an alliance with the Liberal Party
- The Scottish National, Welsh Nationalist
- The Communist Party of Britain

THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY

The Tory Party

- Tory means an Irish highwayman
- The middle and upper classes





THE LIBERAL PARTY THE LABOUR PARTY

- Liberals=Whigs, Whig party
- Represented the trading and manufacturing classes
- 1988 liberal democrats
- Labour Party 1900, by Trade Unions
- 1981 the Social Democratic Party
