

# **TOOLS**



#### <u>AWL</u>

Is used to punch holes in leather, wood and other materials





#### **BOLT**

Is used to fasten objects together



## **BRUSH**

Is used for painting



### BUCKET and MOP

Are used to swab decks







## <u>CHISEL</u>

Is used to chip, carve or cut into solid materials, such as wood, stone or metal



## **CROWBAR**

Is used to remove nails.

It can also be used as a lever







## **GRINDER**




Is used for removing excess material from a piece (polishing)



#### **HANDSAW**

Is used for cutting pieces of wood into different shapes







## **HATCHET**

Is used to cut and split wood









### NEEDLE SCALER



Is used for cleaning heavy paint and rust scale from metal surfaces



#### <u>NUT</u>

Is used to fasten multiple parts together (in conjunction with a bolt)



### **PLIERS**

Are used for holding objects, bending and compressing various materials



## PNEUMATIC HAMMER



Is used for chipping rust; most appropriate for flat surfaces




#### **PRIMER**

Is used as a preparatory coating put on materials before painting. It ensures better sticking of paint to the surface, increases paint durability, and provides additional protection for the material being painted



#### **PUTTY**

Is used to fasten glass and fill cracks in woodwork









## **SCRAPER**

Is used to remove loose paint and scale



## **SCREW**

Is used to fasten objects together







## SOLDERING IRON

Is used for joining metallic surfaces by melting





#### **SOLVENT**

Is used to thin paint










## **TONGS**

Are used to grip and lift objects

Is applied over wood for gloss and protection





## **VISE**

Is used to secure an object to allow work to be performed on it



## WIRE BRUSH

Is used for cleaning rust and removing paint
