Too and enough

- **too** + adjectives and adverbs
- **enough** + noun
- adjectives and adverbs + **enough**

Examples:

- It's too cold for me to go out.
- He spoke too quickly for me to understand.
- It's warm enough to swim, isn't it?
- Do we have enough time to finish our work?
- If we want to be on time, we have to walk quickly enough.
