Reported questions 1. Word order

When we are reporting questions, **the subject** comes before **the verb** (the word order changes to a statement order)

	question word	auxiliary verb	subject		verb

He asked me	what		1	was	doing.

Reported questions 1. Word order

Direct speech	Reported speech
<i>"Where are you going?"</i>	He asked me <i>where I was going</i> .
"What have you done?"	She asked me <i>what I had done.</i>
"Why is she shouting?"	He asked me
"How old is your mother?"	She asked
"Why are you so small?"	The elephant asked the mouse
"When can we have dinner?"	They asked
<i>"What have you bought?"</i>	Her friend asked her
<i>"What were you doing?"</i>	Teacher asked his students
<i>"Where are you hiding him?"</i>	The policeman asked them
"Where were you born?"	We asked him

Reported questions 2. do/does/did

Normal word order is used in reported questions, so it is **not** necessary to use 'do' or 'did':

Direct speech	Reported speech
"Where do they live?"	She asked him <i>where they lived.</i>
"What time does the train arrive?"	She asked <i>what time the train arrived.</i>
"Why did you leave?"	He asked her why she had <i>left.</i>

Reported questions do/does/did

- "When did you come?"
- "Where do you study?"
- "What does he want to know?"
- Who did you invite to the party?"
- "What time do you plan to meet her?"
- "Why does she cry so often?"
- "How long did they stay there?"
- "Who did you talk to?"

Reported questions 3. Negative questions

We do not use the auxiliary verb 'do', except in negative questions.

Direct speech	Reported speech
"Who doesn't like cheese?"	She asked me who didn't like cheese.
"Why don't you listen?"	The teacher asked him why he didn't listen.

Reported questions 3. Negative questions

- "Why didn't you want to watch that film?"
- "Who doesn't speak English here?"
- "What don't you like about England?"
- "Why didn't you go to the theater?"
- "Why don't you do your homework?"
- "What else doesn't he know?"
- "Why didn't you add some more sugar?"
- "Who doesn't live in Pavlovsk?"

Reported questions 4. yes/no questions

We report yes / no questions with 'if' or 'whether'.

Direct speech	Reported speech	
"Do you want to come?" "Have you fed the dog?"	I asked him <i>if he wanted to come.</i> My mother asked <i>whether I had fed the dog.</i> "	
"Are you going with us?"	The teacher asked the kids <i>if they were going with</i> <i>them.</i>	

Reported questions 4. yes/no questions

- "Do you speak English?" He asked me ...
- "Are you British or American?" He asked me
- "Is it raining?" She asked
- "Have you got a computer?" He wanted to know...
- "Can you type?" She asked
- "Did you come by train?" He enquired ...
- "Have you been to Bristol before?" She asked ...
- "What have you been doing?" He asked her ...

Reported questions who, what, which

- When we report questions with 'who, what or which' + to be + complement, the verb 'to be' can come before or after the complement.
- DIRECT SPEECH: "Who is the champion?" REPORTED SPEECH: She asked me who the champion was.

OR She asked me who was the champion.

DIRECT SPEECH: "What **is** your favourite colour?" REPORTED SPEECH: She asked me what my favourite colour **was**.

OR She asked me what **was** my favourite colour.
