May/Might + verb express a possibility in the future.



The doctor said that I **might** need to get some glasses.

She will test my vision this afternoon.

Will expresses more certainty.

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
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
Maybe is an adverb that means possibly.



Maybe I will look like this next time you see me.

Maybe comes in front of a subject and verb.

The adverb **maybe** is not the same as the two word verb **may be**.



Maybe my glasses will be ready on Friday. But they may be ready this afternoon.

Future time clauses show the order of future events.

before we drive to the dance after class is over until I finish that project as soon as it is published by the time I finish it when you get to my house 30

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Let's have dinner **before** we drive to the dance.

Event 1: we have dinner

Event 2: we go to the dance

After class is over, we'll study in the library.

Event 1: class ends

Event 2: we study in the library

I will work really hard until I finish that project.

Event 1: I work really hard

Event 2: I finish that project

She's going to buy that book as soon as it is published.

Event 1: the book gets published

Event 2: she buys the book

I will be really tired of that project by the time I finish it.

Event 1: I will be really tired of it

Event 2: I finish that project

When you get to my house, I'll show you my new kittens.

Event 1: you get to my house

Event 2: I show you my new kittens

A future time clause uses the simple present tense, **not** will or be going to.

We will have dinner before we drive to the dance.

We will have dinner before we will give to the dance.

A future time clause uses the simple present tense, not will or be going to.

I will finish my homework after I eat dinner tonight.

I will finish my homework after I'm goin o eat dinner tonight.

I'll be very happy if I can finish this project.

same meaning

If I can finish this project, I'll be very happy.

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An **if-clause** begins with **if** and has a **subject** and a **verb**.

I'll be very happy if I can finish this project.

If it rains, we will stay home.

If I can't buy an ipad, I'll buy an ipod.
