

Red Wolf

The red wolf, also known as the Florida wolf or Mississippi Valley wolf. Is a canid of unresolved taxonomic identity native to the Eastern United States. It is generally, morphologically, an intermediate between the coyote and gray wolf, and is of a reddish, tawny color. The red wolf is a federally listed endangered species of the United States, and is protected by law. It has been listed by LUSN as a critically endangered species since 1996.

Lifestyle and nutrition



- The red wolf lives and hunts in packs of 5-12 individuals (sometimes more), apparently unifying animals of several generations. Relations within the pack are usually non-aggressive. He hunts mainly during the day, pursuing the victim for a long time. Extraction varies from rodents and lizards to deer (zambar, axis) and antelope (nilgau, garna). Unlike many dogs, red wolves kill game, not creeping at the throat, but attacking from
