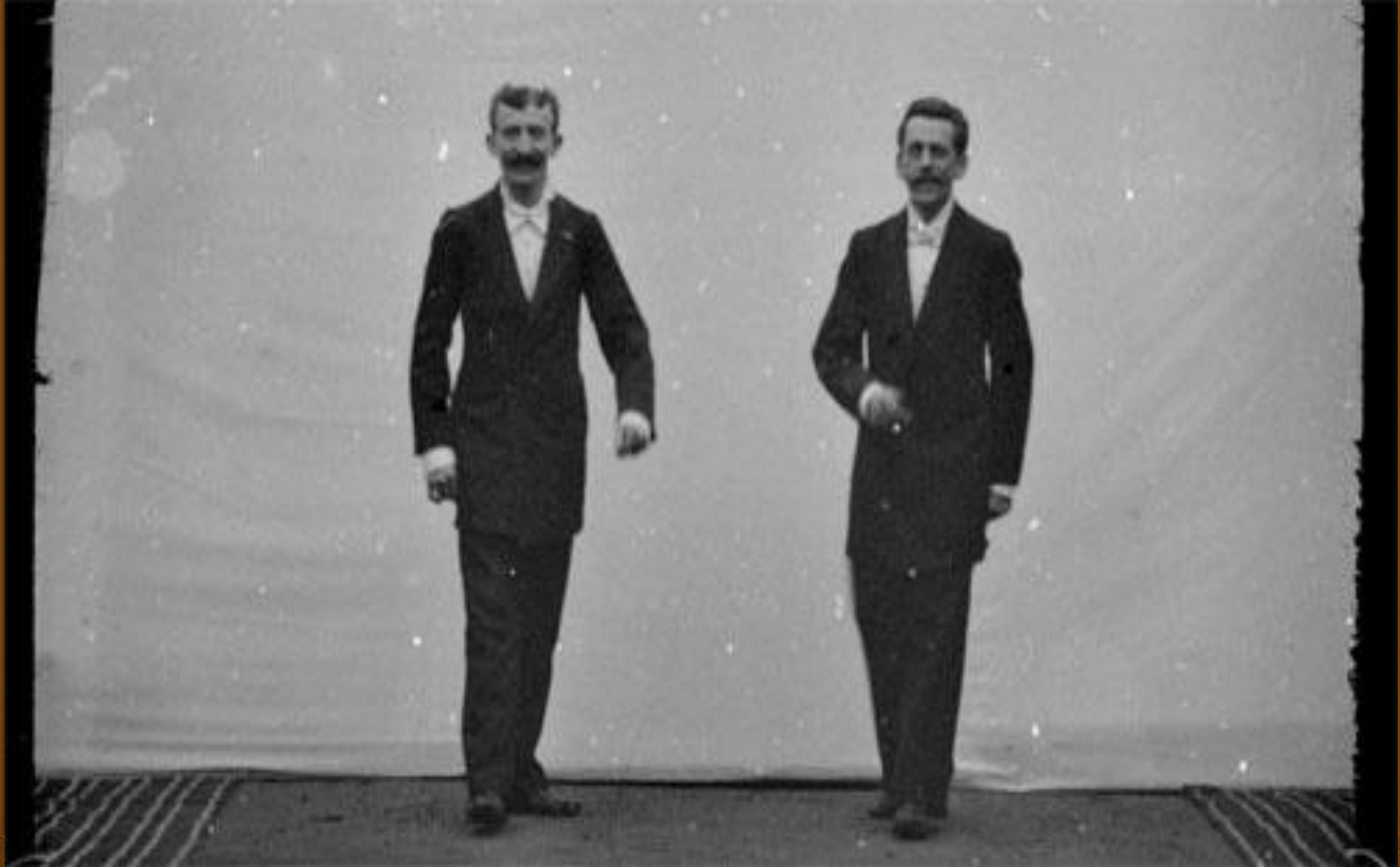


Russian Cinematography



The spreading of cinematography in Russia started with the demonstration of the Lumiere brothers' film in May 1896 in St. Petersburg and Moscow and later in Nizhni Novgorod.



The film making industry developed mainly in St. Petersburg

V. Kholodnaya



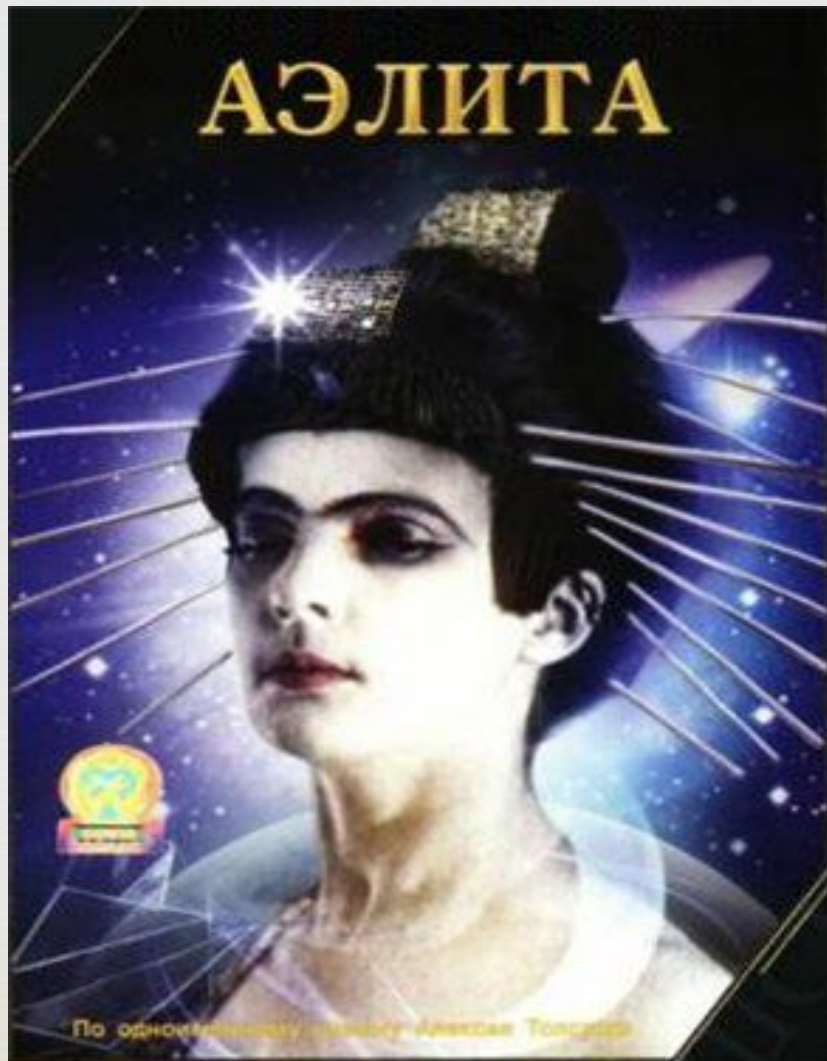

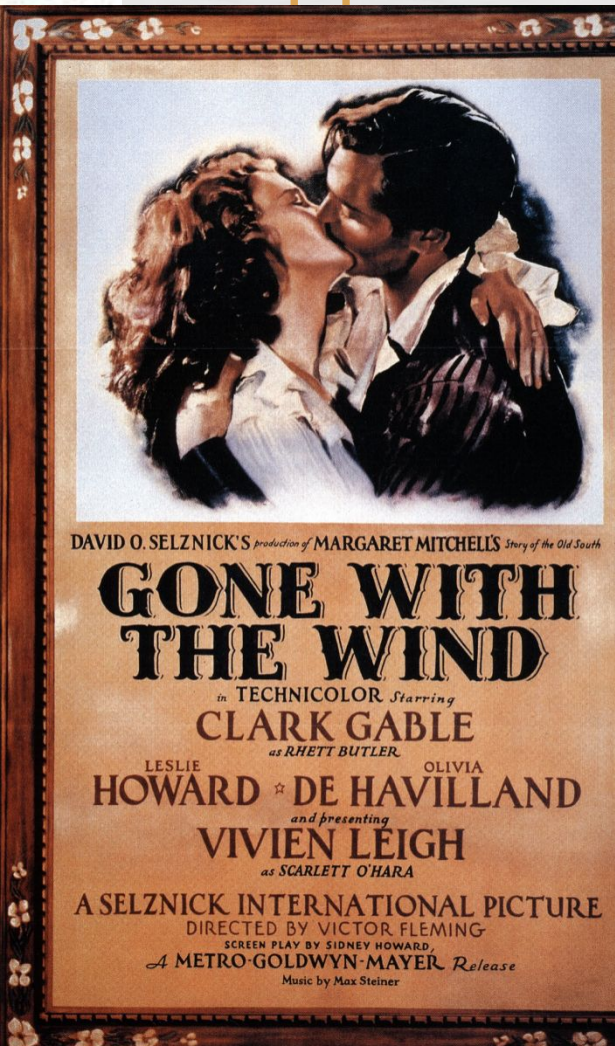

The most popular genres of Russian films were historic films and screen versions of famous novels.



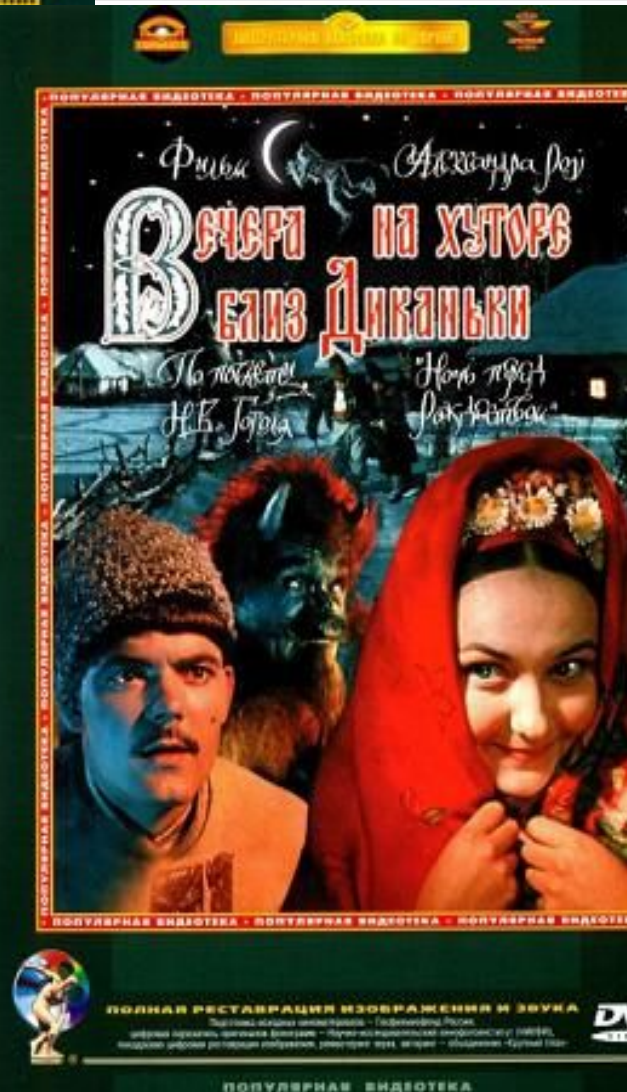
The first sound films simultaneously appeared in three countries, the USSR, USA, and Germany at the end of the 1920s.

The greatest attention was paid to films for children. One of the most famous directors is A. Rou, the creator of fairy tales.



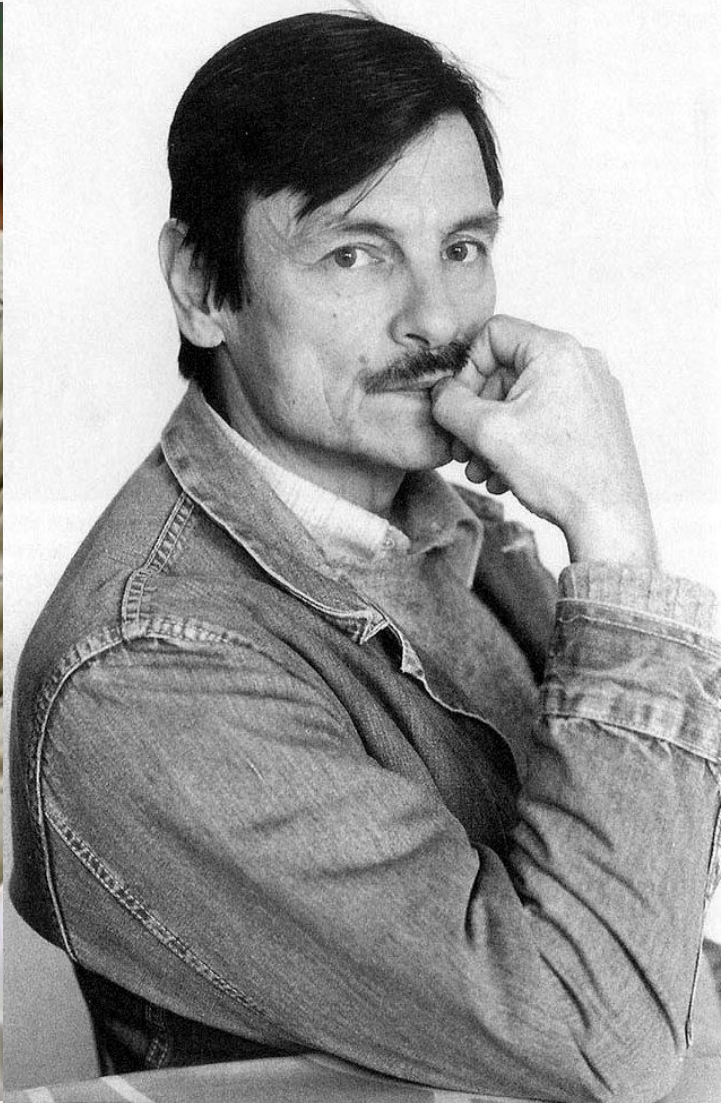
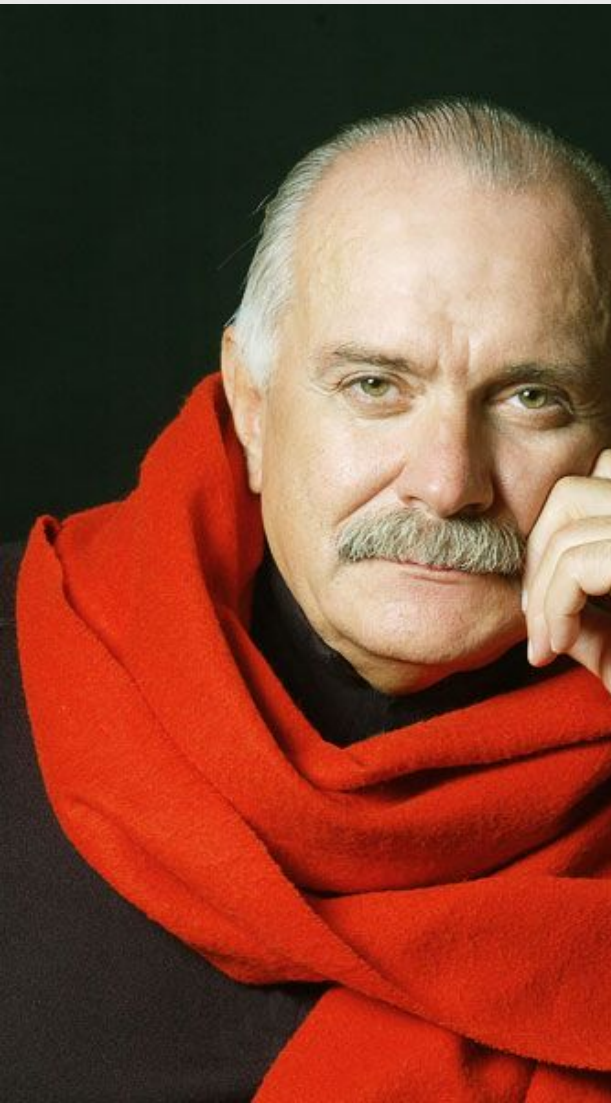
Another famous actor and director whose name is inseparably linked with children's films is R. Bykov.

realistic pieces of art.

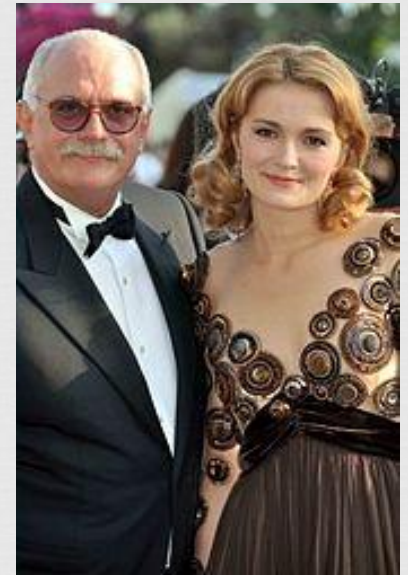
