What **do** they **do** at the park every Saturday?

Affirmative (He/She/It)



She loses.

Negative (I/You/We/They)

I **do not** like computers.

I **don't** like computers.



Affirmative and negative (He/She/It)

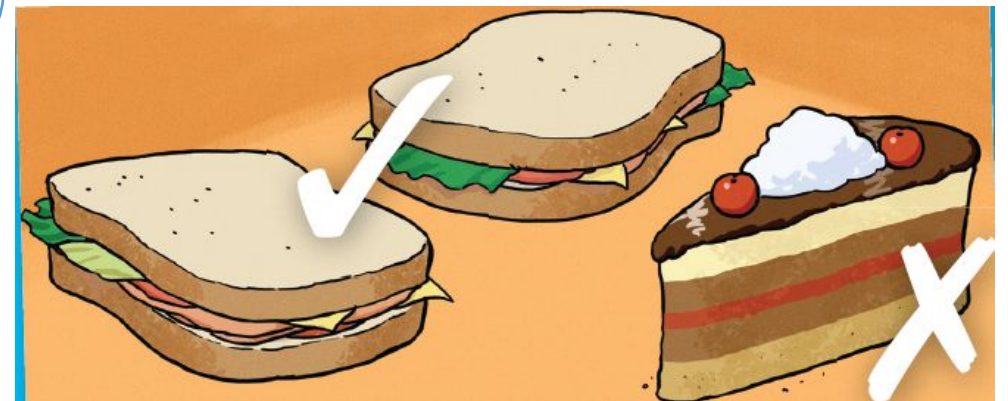
She likes sandwiches.



She **does not** like cakes.



She **doesn't** like cakes.



Questions and short answers



Do you **go** to school by bus?

Yes, I **do**.



No, I **don't**.



Questions (and short answers)

Does it run fast?

Yes, it **does**.



No, it **doesn't**.



Can you remember the rules?

Use the present simple for things that **happen regularly** or that are **always true**.

In positive sentences:

- with **I, you, we** and **they**, use the base form of the verb.
- with **he, she** and **it**, add **-s** (or **-es** with verbs that end -s, -sh, -ch, -x, or -z).

In negative sentences:

- with **I, you, we** and **they**, use **do not**.
- with **he, she** and **it**, use **does not**.

In questions:

- with **I, you, we** and **they**, use the auxiliary **do**.
- with **he, she** and **it**, use the auxiliary **does**.
