






Affirmative (Ha/Sha/I+)








Negative (I/You/We/They)


She likes sandwiches.

Can you remember the rules?

Use the present simple for things that happen regularly or that are always true.

In positive sentences:

- with I, you, we and they, use the base form of the verb.
 - with he, she and it, add -s (or -es with verbs that end -s, -sh, -ch, -x, or -z).

In negative sentences:

- with I, you, we and they, use do not.
 - with he, she and it, use does not.


In questions:

- with I, you, we and they, use the auxiliary do.
- with he, she and it, use the auxiliary does.
