What Was This Area Like in Colonial Times? What Did the Wall Keep Out?



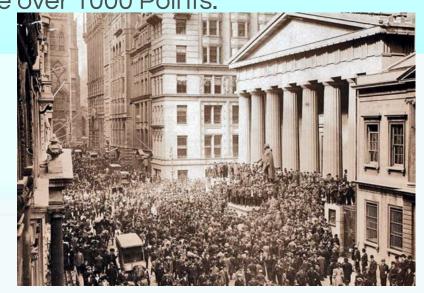

Wall Street has also been the root of multiple major market events, such as on <u>November 14th 1972</u> the day ended for the first time with the Dow Jones Average over 1000 Points.





How Did it Become a Place for Stock Trading and Finances?

 A group of people in <u>1792</u> established the <u>Buttonwood Association</u>, which is believed to be the roots of the stock exchange on Wall Street, New York.
