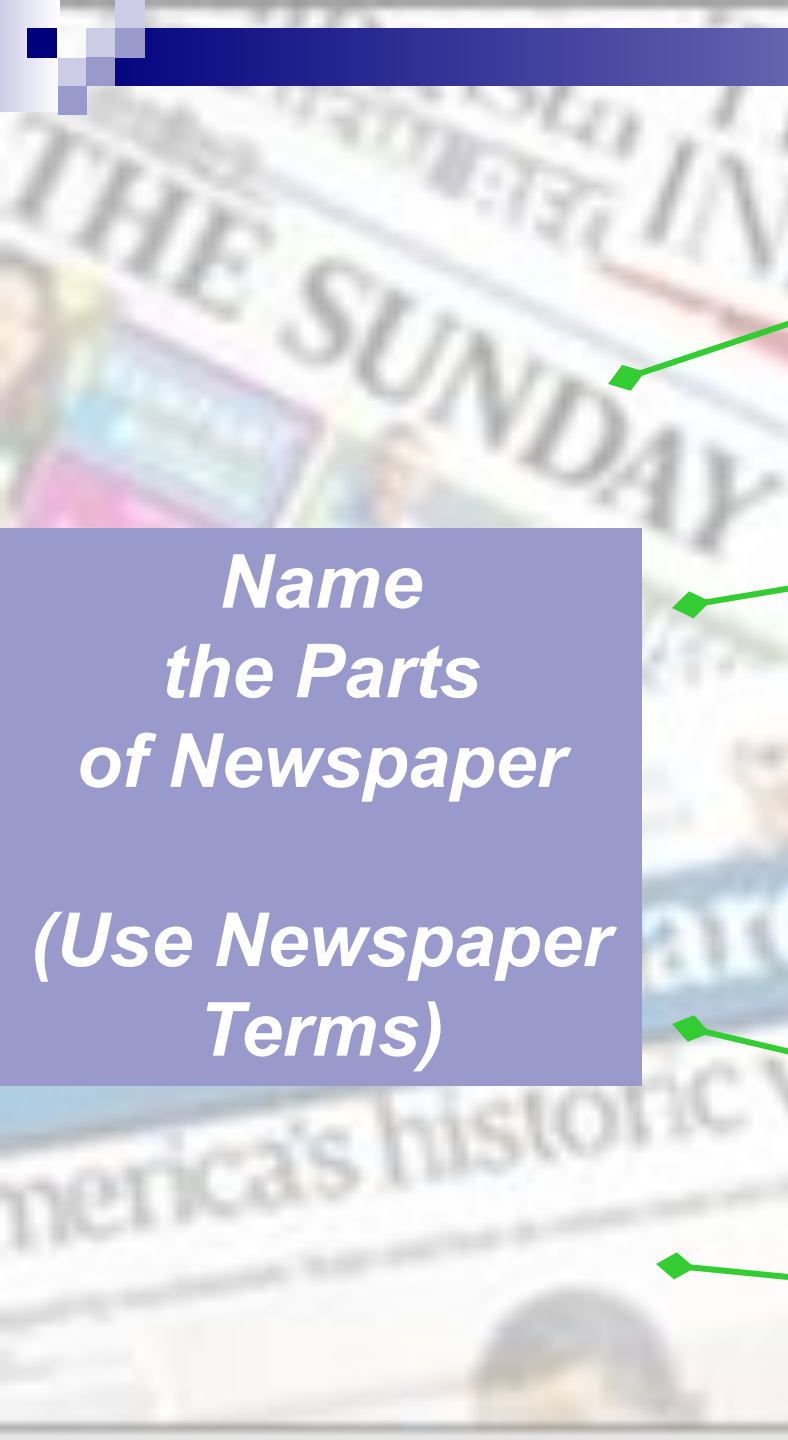

Willshire, 25, told the television channel five... the challenge for his... the challenge marks another chapter in his remarkable life. 18 years after being diagnosed as autistic. As a boy he could not speak and knew no words. He was given a pencil and paper. Soon his... drawing and buildings. Prof Simon Baron-Cohen, director of Cambridge University's Autism Research Centre, said: "We can appreciate so why Stephen chose buildings as the first topic of drawing. In that building stay the same every time you look at them. People with autism like routines, they like repetition, they like patterns in the environment."

Willshire was awarded an MBE for his services to art in 2006 and has his own gallery on Pall Mall, central London. His originals will be thousands of pounds.
