AS THE SUBJECT OF A SENTENCE:

**STUDYING IS HARD BUT
INTERESTING.**



**AFTER CERTAIN VERBS LIKE
*ADMIT, AVOID, CONSIDER,
INVOLVE, RISK, SUGGEST.***

I **SUGGEST STUDYING THIS
BOOK**



AFTER PREPOSITIONS

I'M INTERESTED *IN* STUDYING

**AFTER VERBS OF LIKING OR DISLIKING, E.G
LIKE, LOVE, ENJOY, CAN'T STAND, DON'T MIND,
HATE**

I *ENJOY* WATCHING TV

**WITH GO TO TALK ABOUT PHYSICAL
ACTIVITIES.**

***GO* RUNNING, SWIMMING, CYCLING**



WE USE THE INFINITIVE:

**TO EXPLAIN WHY SOMEBODY
DOES SOMETHING/**

***WHY DID HE GO TO
UNIVERCITY? TO STUDY
LANGUAGES.***




IMMEDIATELY AFTER ADJECTIVES.

**IT'S *GOOD* TO REVISE WITH OTHER
PEOPLE**

**AFTER *TOO, ENOUGH, THE FIRST,*
*THE LAST***

IT'S *TOO* COLD TO GO OUT.



**AFTER CERTAIN VERBS, SUCH AS
WANT, LEARN, AGREE, DECIDE, EXPECT,
HOPE, SEEM, TRY, WOULD LIKE, APPEAR,
ARRANGE, ASK, ATTEMPT, ENCOURAGE,
FORCE, MANAGE, HELP, NEED, PROMISE!**
