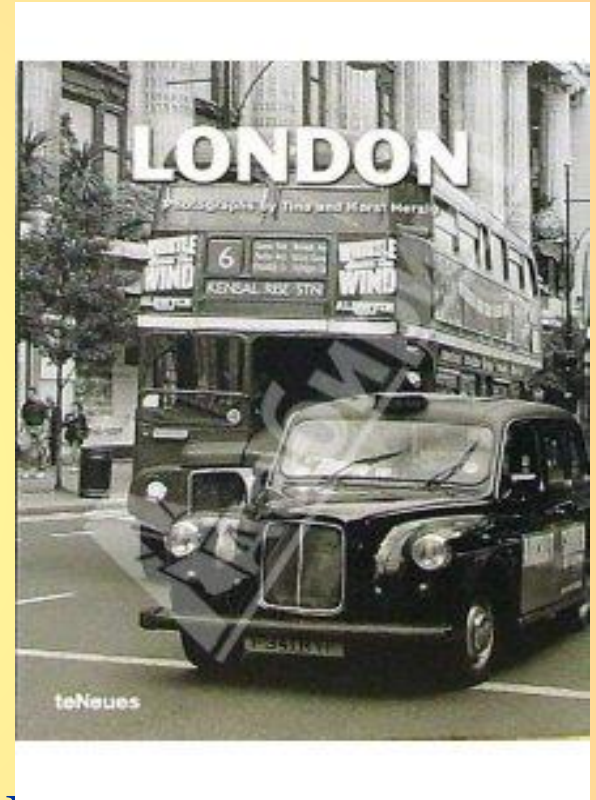

- **London is one of the largest cities in the world.**



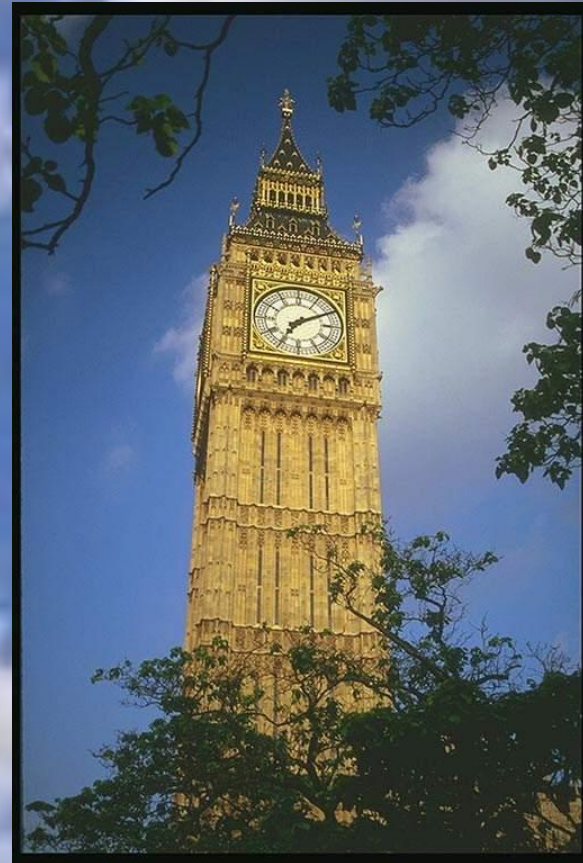
# THE THAMES

# THE BRITISH MUSEUM

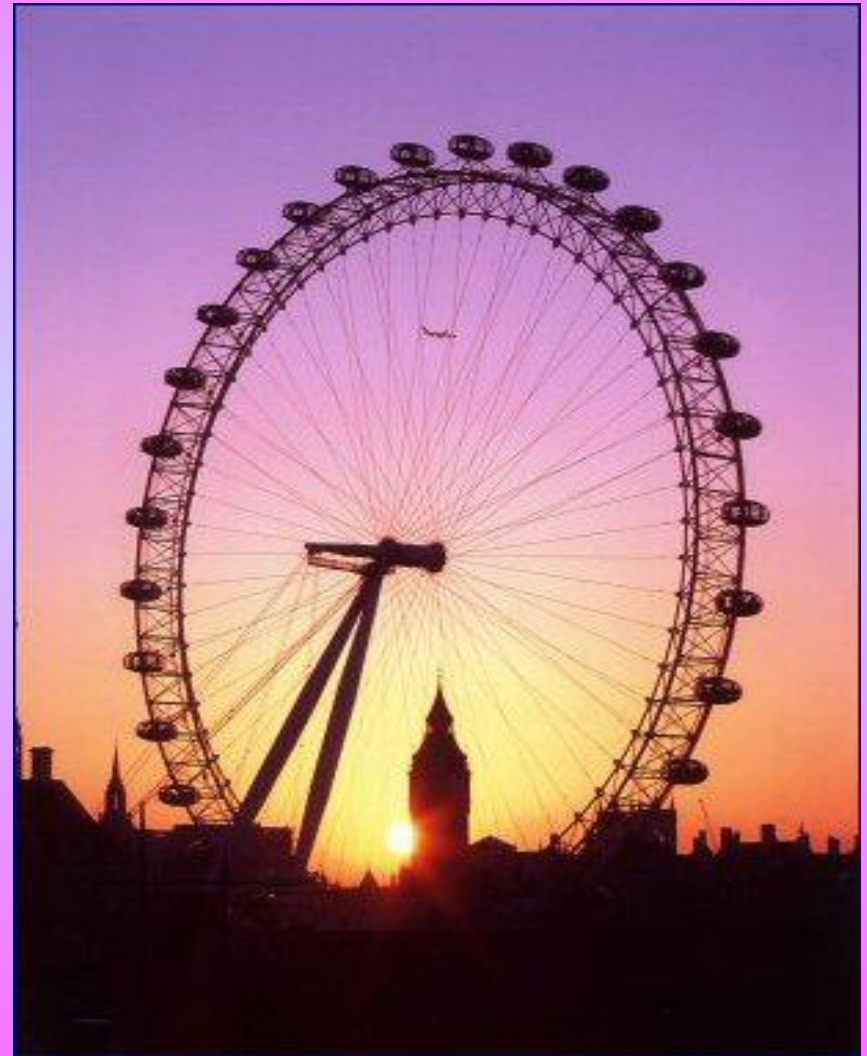
- One of the greatest museums in the world.

# THE TATE MODERN GALLERY

- Open: 10 a.m. – 6 p.m. (Saturday - Tuesday) and 10 a.m. – 10 p.m. (Friday - Saturday).
