


English Grammar Verb


Verb shows an action and answers the question "What is to do?".

Example: go, sleep, rest, work.



Verb







Regular verbs

A verb, that gets a new ending -ed in the Past.

When the verb ends with −y it changes to −i:

cry - cried

tidy - tidied

2. When the verb ends with –e it gets only –d:

lik<u>e</u> – lik<u>ed</u>

agree - agreed











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Regular verbs

When the verb ends with the short stressed vowel and a consonant it gets the doubled consonant and –ed:

slip – slipped

stop - stopped



Regular verbs

But!

play - played

stay – stayed

enjoy - enjoyed



Irregular verb has different forms in the Present and the Past.

1. It gets –t or –d in the end:

burn – burn<u>t</u>

hear – hear<u>d</u>

2. It changes –d for –t:

spen<u>d</u> – spen<u>t</u>

sen<u>d</u> - sen<u>t</u>









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3. It changes the vowel:

drive – drove

write – wrote


4. It makes the new ending:

keep - kept

sleep - slept







cut - cut

put – put

It gets the ending —ought:

bring – brought

catch - cought











But!

do – did

go – went

be – was/were
