# When to use argument writing?


 When you have an opinion about a given topic and try to prove it with reliable arguments and evidence or convince the reader to accept it.



# Expressing arguments for and against a topic

For example,
argue for or against the
pandemic reponse policies
pursued by
the governments of states
worldwide

#### Thesis Statement

### The argumentative thesis takes a side of an issue

So the thesis statement for the topic above might be:

"Governments should suspend the lockdown measures"

Someone else might argue:

"Governments worldwide should extend the lockdown in their states"

### Organizing the body

#### **CLAIMS**

- Your opinion or position on an issue
- Must be supported with evidence
- (facts, data, quotes)
- Evidence must be explained

#### **COUNTER CLAIMS**

- Consider the opposite side
- Or turn against your argument to challenge it
- Refute / rebut the counter argument to reaffirm your position

# Refutation/Rebuttal Paragraph

- This is also used to support your claim.
- Use the counter arguments to show that your idea is the stronger one.
- Do not focus only on the opposing ideas.

#### Reminder: 'Rebut' And 'Refute' Do Not Mean The Same Thing

- Rebut: To contradict ... or oppose, esp. in a formal manner by argument, proof, etc. as in a debate.
- **Refute:** To prove (a person) to be wrong; confute. ... To prove (an argument or statement) to be false or wrong, by argument or evidence."
- To rebut is to try to prove something isn't true, but to refute is to actually prove it isn't.

#### Useful Words & Phrases

Useful words and phrases

When you can think of the opposing opinion but you have not seen it written anywhere:

could be claimed

It may be asserted that... However,
might be argued

### **Tips**

- Avoid strong feelings (e.g. nobody does this, it is impossible to disagree with me)
- Use generalizations (e.g. people say/believe/consider) but
- Do not use generalization (e.g. everybody believes that...)
- Do not use strong personal expressions (e.g. I think)
- Use linking words (e.g. therefore, although, however etc.)
- Use sequencing (e.g. firstly, secondly, lastly)
- Make reference to other sources (e.g. The government claims that...)
- Give examples- not personal thoughts (e.g. products such as sprayer can destroy the environment)
- Give up banal (unoriginal, boring) introductions. Write something more original (Don't write: This topic has been important since ancient times.)
