Peter I ordered the building to be surrounded by “Prussian” striped guard booths, which were specially made and sent to the Winter Palace from Gatchina and Pavlovsk to house the clock.

in the Cathedral of the Savior Not Made by Hands, under the altar there was the famous “milenka” of Catherine II. There she spent time with her “favorites”
