


Drivers

Winter




- Russian winter for foreigners, especially those living in warm countries, is an extremely bright impression.

Balalaika


- ☐ The inhabitants of Russia had a few of their own musical instruments, and one of them is a balalaika.
- ☐ This stereotype has no negative coloring, it is a typical symbol of the country in the eyes of foreigners.




Result of interview for UK
