run into somebody


(informal) to meet somebody by chance

Guess who I ran into today!

run into something

- 1 to enter an area of bad weather while travelling
 - We ran into thick fog on the way home.
- 2 to experience difficulties, etc.
 - Be careful not to run into debt.
 - to run into danger/trouble/difficulties
- 3 to reach a particular level or amount
 - Her income runs into six figures (= is more than £100 000, \$100 000, etc.).
