— Aristotle

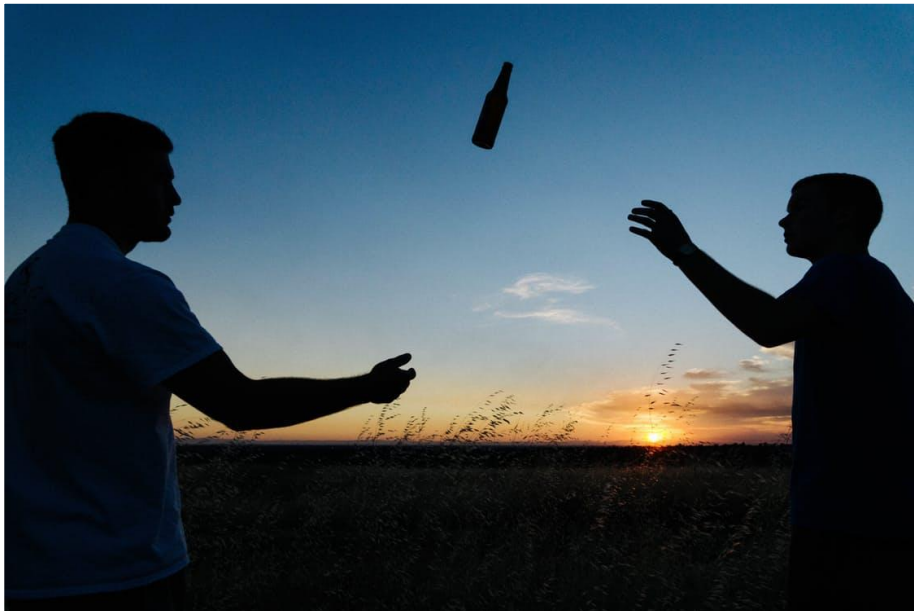
Being a devoted philosopher, Aristotle had put a lot of thought into any subject of life he touched, and of course he couldn't miss such a big part of life as friendship.



He devoted 1/10 of his work to find out, what relationships can really be called friendship, and in result he divided it into three kinds.



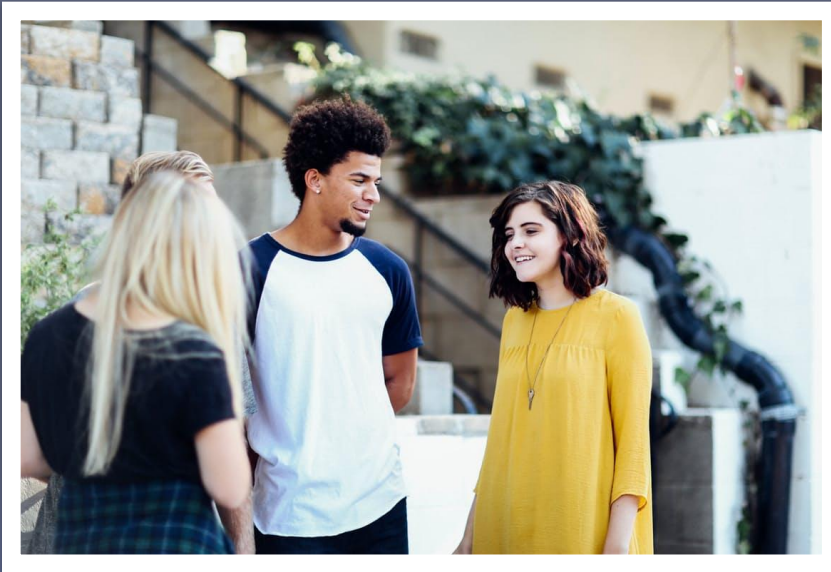
The first one is **Friendship of utility**:
exists between you and someone who is useful
to you in some way.



The second one is **Friendship of pleasure**: exists between you and those whose company you enjoy.

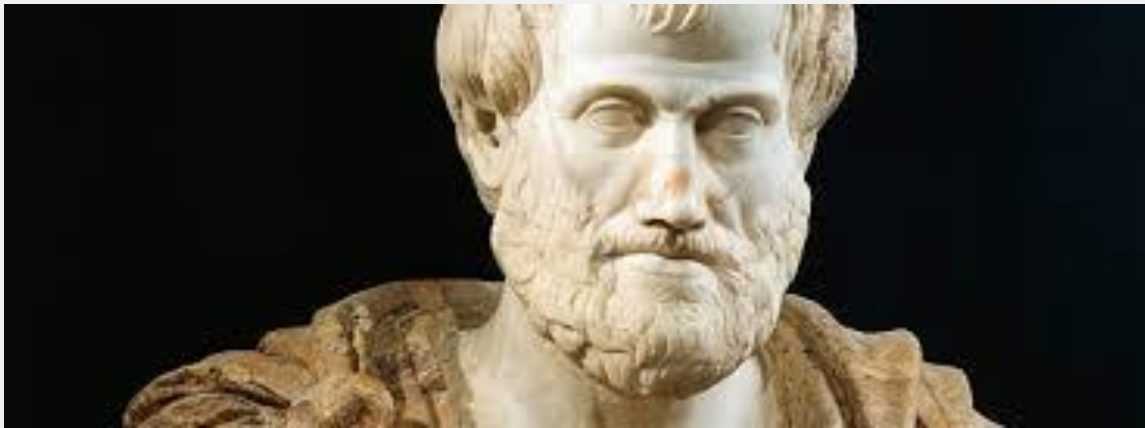


And the final one is **Friendship of the good**:
