Structure: « to have (something) done » to have + past participle

We use this form when we do <u>not</u> do the action ourselves.

Some examples:

I'm having my hair cut today.
He had his bike repaired yesterday.
He'll have his wedding suit made.





You can also use (get) instead of (have) in some cases:

- ·We get our brochures printed in Bordeaux.
- ·I'll get the office cleaned every day.
- •\$he gets the windows cleaned regularly.

Other structures: When we talk about what we ask other people to do, we can use have + object + bare infinitive:

·I'll have my secretary call you tomorrow.

We can also use get + object + to infinitive:

·I'll get my secretary to call you tomorrow.
