MAKING TIME FOR THE CHILDREN

According 1 a recent government study, twenty-five per cent of British parents have reduced their working life over the last ten years to spend more time with their family. Some have gone parttime, others have changed their career path, for example by choosing small family-friendly employers. Working mothers and fathers often ² looking after their children.
