






Hyde Park

Green Park






- The Green Park is a park in the City of Westminster, central London.

- You can find Canada Memorial and the Constance Fund



St. James's Park






- It is the oldest of the Royal Parks of London.

Regent's Park






- Regent's park contains Regent's College and the London Zoo.
- It provides wide range of facilities and amenities including gardens, a lake with a heronry, waterfowl and a boating area, sports pitches, and children's playgrounds.




- The Open Air Theatre is located in the park.
