 outlines the overall structure and objectives of the work

a summary of the research paper

one paragraph long

### **INTRODUCTION**

500 words

sets the tone for the readers

- enables the readers to form some idea of:
  - the content
  - the structure
  - the writer's position

gives an understanding of what you want to do and why



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#### **BACKGROUND**

PROBLEM STATEMENT

PROFESSIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

→presents the *context* for the study

outlines the *general state of knowledge* about the research problem

makes a brief reference to the literature

→ identifies gaps in knowledge

→justifies the *choice* of the topic focus

→suggests the *rationale* for doing research

→outlines possible *benefits* of the research

### broad information

(what is **known** about the topic)




more specific information

### PROBLEM STATEMENT

PROFESSIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

- a clear formulation of the *research problem*
- indicates some likely *hypotheses*
- defines *aims* and *objectives*
- defines *the scope* of the project

sets the boundaries of your proposed research

PROBLEM STATEMENT

<del>PROFESSIONAL</del> SIGNIFICANCE

why the proposed study is worth doing-

what contribution it will make to professional knowledge.

theoretical and practical implications

 an outline of the theoretical literature and empirical research

 concise justification of the methodological approach you intend to use

a brief report on the results

## LITERATURE REVIEW



**RESULTS** 

-sets the project in the *context of existing knowledge* 

briefly outlines the *general state of knowledge* about the research problem

— the history of the topic


— key landmark studies

what was known in the past



what you intend to discover

## "Five C's" of writing a literature review

- 1. <u>Cite</u>: keep the primary focus on the literature pertinent to your research problem.
- 2. **Compare** the arguments, theories, methodologies, and findings expressed in the literature.
- 3. **Contrast** the arguments, themes, methodologies, approaches and controversies expressed in the literature.
- 4. **Critique** the literature.
- 5. **Connect** the literature to your own area of research and investigation

LITERATURE REVIEW

#### **METHODOLOGY**

**RESULTS** 

gives concise justification for the quantitative, qualitative or some other approach

→accounts for the use of the data



conclusions and recommendations are *valid* and *credible* 

200 words

tables and figures to summarise quantitative results

trends and concepts identified from qualitative analysis-

data interpretation



How will your research refine, revise, or extend existing knowledge?

100-150 words

## **CONCLUSION**

- contains evidence of *evaluation* of the work
- refers back to the *thesis statement*
- draws upon the *comments* made about the results
- provides reference to further analysis that might be carried out on the topic

### The **conclusion** emphasises:

1. why the research problem is *worth investigating* 

2. why your research study is *unique* 

3. how it *advances knowledge*
