Enterprising

Discernment

Gumption

- Disapproving
- (of books, plays, etc.) involving serious and complicated or artistic ideas, or (of people)interested in serious and complicated subjects
- This is a film for highbrows (those who are interested in complicated subjects)

Highbrow

• showing a clear and usually original understanding of a complicated problem or situation:

Insightful
