To refer to habits or to things which happen repeatedly.

To refer to permanent situations

To talk about general statements of truth.

Romes Affirmative. He / She / It plays. I / You / We / They play. Negative. He / She / It doesn't play. I / You / We / They don't play.



Interrogative: Does He / She / It play? Do I / You / We / They play? Short forms Does not = Doesn't Do not = don't



How to make he / she/ it forms:


General rule

It takes -s.


Example:

Adverbs of frequency like usually, sometimes, almost, never, etc, are used to express how often things happen. They come: Before the verb. For example: I

usually go to school by bus.
After the verb To Be. For example: She is often with her friends at weekends.
