


The Pronouns Classification of pronouns

- 1)personal: i,he,she,it,we,you,they
- 2)possesive:my,his,her,its,our,your,their
- 3)reflexsive:myself,himself,herself,itself,ourselves
- 4)reciprocal:each other,one another
- 5)demonstrative:this,that,such
- 6)interogative:who,whose,what,which
- 7)relative: who, whose, which, that, as
- 8)conjuctive:who,whose,which,what
- 9)defining:each,every,everybody,everyone
- 10)indefinite:some,any,somebody,anybody,thing
- 11)negative:no,none,neither,nobody,no one





Case

 Each personal pronoun has three cases: subject, object, and possessive. Which form to use depends on the pronouns function in a sentence.

Subject: He read about Death Valley.

Object: Julie asked him about the rocks.

Possessive: Ramon brought his book.

Possessive Pronouns:

- Some pronouns can take the place of possessive nouns.
- · A pronoun that shows ownership is called a possessive pronoun.
 - my your her his
- An ant crawled on her leg.
- I swept ants off their table.


Possessive Pronouns

Possessive pronouns have two forms. One form is used before a noun. The other form is used alone.

	Singular	Plural
Used	my	our
before	your	your
nouns	his, her, its	their
Used	mine	ours
alone	yours	yours

We use reflexive pronouns when the pronoun both does and receives the action.

(Reflexive pronouns always act as objects, not subjects.)



Right:

"I hurt myself."

"She dressed herself."



"He locked himself out of the car."



Wrong:

"John and myself are sick."

"They loved Sam and ourselves."

- 2.Reflexsive pronouns may be used as predicatives
- Ex:When she came back she was herself again
- 3. Reflexsive pronouns may be used to form the reflexive voice (in this case reflexive pronouns are structural words) Ex:And then I dressed myself and came away to find you





RECIPROCAL PRONOUNS

A reciprocal pronoun is a pronoun used to identify an action or feeling that is reciprocated

We use reciprocal pronouns when each of two or more subjects is acting in the same way towards the other.

For example, Ram is talking to Sita, and Sita is talking to Ram. So we say-


Ram and Sita are talking to each other

THERE ARE TWO TYPES OF RECIPROCAL PROHOUNS IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE:



Reciprocal pronouns have 2 cases 1.Common case-used as an object Ex: They are shaking hands with one another

2.General case-used as an attribute Ex:They took each other`s hands

Interrogative pronouns

They are those words used to ask for an element of the sentence.

We always find them in the beginning of the interrogative sentence.

They usually start by the letters "wh-".

Example: The man who works at the Post Office is very kind.







WHICH

It is used to refer to animals and objects

Example: Tina has a bunch of flowers which his friend bought.



It is used to refer to possession

Example: Whose is that dictionary?

Have you seen the girl whose father



WHERE

WHEN

It is used to refer to people, animals,

It can replace WHO or WHICH

Example: The blue jacket that she is putting on belongs to her friend.

It used to refer to places

The hotel where we slept was excellent



That was the day when my sister was born
