Animals Red Book of Kazakhstan

Today, it must be noted that human activities have a negative impact on nature, including Kazakhstan. Many animal species in danger of extinction, sometimes through direct destruction, so environmentalists all over the world are sounding the alarm for a long time, so in 1963, has been specially created Red Book of the International Union for Conservation of Nature. Kazakhstan also has a red book of animals Kazakhstan, which includes 40 mammals, 57 birds, 3 amphibians, 18 fish and 10 reptiles.

Animals Red Book of Kazakhstan subject to special protection. This is a rare and endangered species of animals .In the Red Book of Kazakhstan are included animals such as the snow leopard, sand cat, Pallas' cat, red wolf, cheetah, gazelle, argali, tugai deer, Tien Shan brown bear and other animals.

Red Wolf is the only representative of this genus in the nature of Kazakhstan and CIS countries. The red wolf lives in the mountains is probably why he almost did not come across a person.



The snow leopard is listed in the Red Book of Kazakhstan as endangered, their habitat are thirteen states including Kazakhstan. Among the big cats he is the only permanent resident of the Central Asian mountains.



Turan tiger is almost extinct by now.
Turan tiger lived not only in Central Asia but also in the eastern and southern shores of the Caspian Sea - the Caucasus and Iran.

Included in the Red Data Book of Kazakhstan and Argali mountain dwellers, mountain sheep. The main location of argali habitat in Kazakhstan is the Karatau Mountains, the Tien-Shan, Jungar Alatau.Currently argali population grows.

Equus hemionus(Туркменский кулан)-9 is one of the species of horses, and the only one living in the present time in Kazakhstan .Equus hemionus Contained in Almaty and Karaganda zoo. In the Almaty Zoo in 1987 from kulan produced offspring.







In Kazakhstan, there are 25 specially protected areas, including 10 nature reserves and 11 national parks. These environmental institutions owned by the state.
